A Message from our President

Have you had an adventure lately? One of the things I was able to do this summer was take a mini-trip to Sheboygan to see Bookworm Gardens. It was so much fun to see the gardens that were brought to life based on the eyes of the children. They were able to experience things by playing in the garden without being told don't touch, or watch out for that plant, etc. There was so much to see. A few of the highlights were a school bus in the garden where the people could play, a living couch, planters of animals, picture frames where the children could have their picture taken, Frankie's dog-house, bears made out of vines, a musical garden with instruments the children could play, a treehouse overlooking the drop-off, a storybook area where stories were read to the children, a butterfly garden with a butterfly bench, a farm area where children could experience planting, a Poppy garden outside a library area, a pond area with gold fish and lily pads, a golf clubhouse with a putting green, the three bears houses, and an area where kids could wash the Dalmatian dog statue. In September, I traveled to Appleton to meet with the Scholarship Investment Chairman, Marion Books and the Scholarship Investment Team Lucy Valitchka and Judy Newman to find out more about our investments at the Community Foundation. At that meeting we were given a very thorough explanation of the funds in each of the accounts and the scholarships that were given in 2019. As a reminder, Community Foundation holds the funds for following scholarship funds: WGCF Federation, Della H. Balousek, Myrtle B Ogilvie, and Irene Straus. There were 10 scholarships that were given in 2019 for a total of \$14,500.

As a reminder, the investments at the Community Foundation are monitored by the Foundation. The Community Foundation approaches the schools throughout the state of Wisconsin that have programs that meet the criteria set up for these scholarships to obtain applicants. WGCF works with the Community Foundation in determining the amount distributed for the scholarships. Once the applications are received, they are sent to WGCF, where our WGCF committee reviews these applications. WCGF determines the scholarship award winners and then the Community Foundation distributes the scholarship awards and follows up to ensure the scholarship awards are cashed.

This was my first experience with The Community Foundation. I found the meeting to be extremely informative. Our contact provided a list of

Bangor Garden Club

The Bangor Garden Club, one of the recipients of the 2019 WGCF Grant, used their award to purchase planters that were placed next to the new Stockyard Park sign.

Bangor Garden Club worked with the Bangor Historical Society to find a way to educate the community of the stockyard's history and transformation into a park. What they came up with was a sign that would tell that history.

In the early 1900s, the Milwaukee Road Railroad began shipping cattle and hogs from Bangor to a meat packing center in Cudahy. In 1940, Clinton Davey, a stockbuyer, farmer and grocery store owner, and his assistant John Meyer shipped 626 cars of stock from the village's stockyard.

That feat earned Bangor the reputation of being the "shippingest" cattle town of its size in the U.S., according to a November 2, 1941 Milwaukee Sentinel article. In that same article, Davey said that on Mondays and Wednesdays, the Bangor Railroad yards looked like Kansas City.

That stockyard eventually became abandoned when trucking became the preferred method of conveying livestock. The land is now a park where the Bangor Garden Club has put its green touch with planting flowers and shrubs and making it an inviting place to visit.

The sign is a partnership between the Bangor Garden Club, the Bangor Historical Society, the Village of Bangor, and the estate of Margaret Chalsma, who left funds to the community for signage. The sign was made by inmates at the Stanley Correctional Institution, as a part of a vocational program.

Dedication of the sign was held on August 11, during Bangor Fun Daze.

We are looking for a WGCF Chairman and a local Chairman. This can be a co-chair position especially when it comes to the local chairman. Without a volunteer to help out for these positions, we will not have Garden Schools in Wisconsin. We will need to go out of state to attend this school.

I know you all enjoy this school. It would be unfortunate to see this school go away. I ask you to think about it. Part of this is bookkeeping, other parts are arranging for the location and speakers.

Below are the job descriptions from our Standing Rules posted on the website under the GARDENING SCHOOLS. WGCF Gardening School/Credentials Chairman shall:

1. Be a member of the Board of Directors.
2. Provide a display of educational materials for the WGCF Annual Convention.
3. Be a nationally accredited Gardening Consultant responsible for the Gardening Schools held within the State.
4. Follow the current GARDENING SCHOOLS HANDBOOK available through NGC Member Services.
5. Be familiar with requirements for instructors.
6. Keep a permanent file including –
 - a. A copy of all completed forms prepared for NGC WGCF Standing Rules Revised 12-27-2018, page 33
 - b. Course number, location and dates
 - c. Subjects and hours devoted to subject
 - d. A compilation of member and non-member registrants
 - e. Names of those taking any part of the course as make-up from previous courses
 - f. Names of those taking refresher courses and number of refresher certificates issued
 - g. A complete record of all Consultants and students in WGCF with full name, address, name of garden club and district, date of Consultant Certificate, all courses attended, refresher courses and all examination grades maintained in a separate up-to-date file
7. Register all courses with the National Accrediting Chairman and properly accredit the courses.
8. Provide a roster of Gardening Consultants to the Editor of Wisconsin Gardens for the Directory Issue.
9. Refer to the “Schools and Symposia General Guidelines” of the Standing Rules.

Local Gardening School Chairman shall:

1. Set date and acquire suitable facilities.
2. Secure qualified instructors.
3. Organize the school so the four courses will be given in sequence, coordinating dates to avoid conflict with other WGCF, Regional or NGC events.
4. Prepare and present a preliminary budget to the Finance Chairman for approval by the committee at least two weeks prior to the Executive Committee Meeting.
5. Provide information for meals and housing.
6. Provide meals, housing and local transportation for instructors.
7. Supply copies of course outlines for each student + 10 extra copies for the proctors and state files.
8. Duplicate all examinations.
9. Provide and punch student attendance card at every session for each course.
10. Prepare and present a detailed financial report at the close of each course and series.
11. Send a list of all paid attendees of each course to the Awards Chairman prior to the annual Awards Committee meeting.

Please think about how you can help. This is not a situation where we can sit back and wait for the next person to step up. If you are willing to help or work together with someone on this, please let me know. Lucy has offered to help mentor anyone coming into the position.

Blue Star and Gold Star Families Memorial Marker Program

NGC's Blue Star Memorial Marker Program began in 1945 to honor the men and women serving in the Armed Forces during World War II. The name was chosen for the star on flags displayed in homes and businesses denoting a family member serving in a time of conflict. If the service member died while serving in a time of conflict, the Service Flag was taken down and replaced with a Gold Star Service Flag.

The designation of Blue Star Highways was achieved through petitions to the state legislatures in cooperation with the Departments of Transportation and a uniform marker was designed to identify those highways. In 1953, Wisconsin legislation created the Blue Star Memorial Highway on STH 23 commencing in Sheboygan and proceeding westerly to its junction with STH 11 in Darlington.

The Blue Star program grew to extend thousands of miles across the continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. All men and women who have served, are serving, or will serve in the Armed Forces of the United States are included.

Markers continue to be dedicated each year on highways, Veterans' facilities, National Cemeteries, parks, and civic and historic sites, showing our appreciation for those who defend our country.

In May 2015, in conjunction with American Gold Star Mothers, Inc., NGC implemented a Gold Star Families Memorial Marker program to honor Gold Star Families, the immediate family members of a service member who died while serving in a time of conflict. Sheboygan's Marker dedicated in 2016 was the very first purchased through NGC's Gold Star program.

There are two types of Blue Star and Gold Star Markers; both are made of cast aluminum and are created by Sewah Studios for NGC:

The large memorial marker (formerly called a memorial highway marker) currently costs \$1,530.00 including shipping. The plate is 41" high by 45" wide. It has its own post and stands 7'8" tall when installed. This type of marker may be placed along highways, in rest areas and near welcome centers. It may also be placed in national cemeteries, veterans' medical centers, parks, gardens, and other civic locations.

The byway marker currently costs \$510.00 including shipping. This smaller 12" high by 20" wide plaque is designed for mounting on masonry, wood or stone. It is to be placed in civic gardens, parks or at historic sites.

Wisconsin currently has 13 Blue Star Memorial Markers: (1 each in Appleton, Ashland, Beloit, Elm Grove, Hurley, McFarland, Portage, Sheboygan, Superior, Rothschild, and Westfield, and 2 in Milwaukee); 1 Gold Star Memorial Marker (Sheboygan); 1 Blue Star Byway Marker (Manitowoc), and 1 Gold Star [Byway] Marker (Madison). Dedication is pending for a Blue Star Memorial Marker (Past President Peggy Grubbs' Project) in Houlton when construction issues have been resolved. That will bring our State's total to 17.

Horticulture

Meet *Ostrya virginiana*, a little known WI native understory tree. *Ostrya* is found in all but 10 of Wisconsin's 72 counties, where it grows in deciduous forests. The *Ostrya* has common names like Ironwood for the very strong wood produced that is often used to make handles for tools or Eastern Hop-hornbeam for the hop-like fruits that are borne on her branches.

Ostryas grow to be 25-40' tall with a spread of horizontal or drooping branches reaching 16-26'. It is a slow grower but has a very graceful look as it ages. The leaves are dark green turning yellow in the fall but are not really head-turning and tend to fall early in the season. Because this species is monoecious, the flowers are really catkins. The males are visible throughout winter and the females are visible in the spring, usually in groups of 3. The fruit (called a nut) is found in papery sacs held in clusters just like hops used for making beer. And finally the bark has a peeling appearance as the tree ages.

Ostrya tolerates deer and drought but is not able to tolerate standing water or even occasional flooding. It is best grown in soils that are dry & rocky but will grow in southeastern Wisconsin with some amendments to our more clay-like soils.

If you are thinking of planting a tree, and we all are thinking of planting trees, consider an *Ostrya*, and you will have a unique tree in your yard.

TRI-REFRESHER PRESENTERS



Take a seat and enjoy the inspirational tale of the Knock Out Rose (R) as told by its creator Will Radler. Will's award-winning Rose has revolutionized the rose industry for its low-maintenance qualities, e.g., impervious to bugs and black spot, repeat blooming from frost to frost, winter hardiness and self cleaning. It is now the industry standard and the most widely-sold rose in the world. Radler graduated from UW-Madison with a BA in Landscape Architecture and spent the next 26 years with the Milwaukee County Park System, 13 years of which was as the Director of Boerner Botanical Gardens. He now pursues his passion for rose and plant breeding full-time. In 2002, Will formed Rose Innovations, LLC which focuses on research and development, education and philanthropy. He has authored the booklet *Rose Growing Simplified*, currently out of print, and co-authored the book, *Rose Gardening*, available but out of print. He has been featured in several other books focusing on roses.



Dr. John Berges earned his PhD in Biological Oceanography from the University of British Columbia and did his postdoctoral work at Brookhaven National Laboratory. He lectured at Queen's University Belfast before becoming a Professor in both the Department of Biological Sciences and the School of Freshwater Sciences at UW-Milwaukee. His presentation will include an overview of fresh-waters on our planet, their rarity and importance, current threats to freshwaters and our Great Lakes in particular. He will include information on our International Joint Commission and the important roles community involvement plays in freshwater ecology.



Chris Schultz is a Certified Public Manager (CPM) earning his credentials through the University of Wisconsin in 2010. In 2019 he earned his Envision Sustainability Professional credential through the Institute for Sustainable Infrastructure. He is a Senior Project Manager in the Planning, Research and Sustainability (PRS) Division for the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD). He serves as the lead project manager on the Green Infrastructure Partnership Program, a funding program for green infrastructure implementation and as the Director of MMSD's Fresh Coast Resource Center.



Shirley Dommer Wolczak is the Garden Director for Boerner Botanical Gardens. She received her BS from UW-River Falls in Agronomy and Horticulture. She brings over 34 years of experience in public horticulture management including overseeing garden collections and resources, supervising staff and volunteers, offering professional development, representing public agencies within the media and directing fiscal operations. The gardens feature formal gardens, one of the largest crab apple gardens in Wisconsin, a rose display garden with over 500 roses, individual gardens including herbs, annuals, shrubs, dillies and peonies.



Nancy Aten, PLA, ASLA is a landscape architect practicing ecological restoration and conservation planning at her firm, Landscapes of Space in Wisconsin, and serves as a consulting landscape architect for The Clearing in Ellison Bay, Door County. Nancy is a notable expert on the work of Jens Jensen. She will introduce us to Jensen's design experience and key threads to his approach as they are understood today and implemented at the Clearing, a Folk School in Ellison Bay, a place thought to be his masterpiece. Nancy has an MS of Landscape Architecture with distinction from the University of Georgia, an earlier MS from Stanford University and a BS from UW-Milwaukee.

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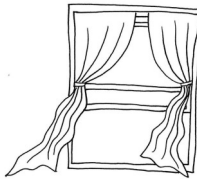

Looking out my window, I find myself reflecting on the song "With Just One Small Voice" that I have heard 4K students learn each year:

*'With just one small voice
Singing out a song
With just one small voice
Singing sweet and strong
One by one they'll grow
And together sing along
And then soon all the world
Will be singing.'*



I find myself also thinking of Greta Thunberg and how this young person has been able to speak out in public and to political leaders and assemblies. Thunberg is known for her straightforward speaking manner in which she urges immediate action to address what she describes as the climate crisis. At home, Thunberg convinced her parents to adopt several lifestyle choices to reduce their own carbon footprint, including giving up air travel and not eating meat.

If a young voice like Thunberg's can speak out about climate crisis, just think of what a group of gardeners might do in addressing environmental concerns. Perhaps your Club or District has noticed environmental concerns or issues in your area. Let us set an example of asking questions and raising concerns as well as taking time to encourage young voices to speak out.
