One of the benefits of belonging to the Wisconsin Garden Club Federation (WGCF) is the ability to receive support and funding for WGCF club related projects. The WGCF Grant Committee is very pleased to announce that it is accepting applications from its member garden clubs for grants up to \$250.

Grants are not designed to support annual operating expenses but may be used either to start a new program or provide matching funds to contribute to the extension of an existing program. Please note that it is expected that the Club or District applying for the grant will actively participate in the project. Projects where the money is passed on to another organization without any involvement of WGCF members will not be funded.

Specifically, grants are designed to help local garden clubs with projects that will enhance:

- Community beautification
- Horticultural education
- Community gardening
- Environmental stewardship

The application deadline for a 2018 WGCF Grant is midnight, March 31, 2019. Awards will be announced at the annual WGCF Convention May 16-18th in Madison. Meeting attendance is not required. Projects should be completed and a feedback report sent by November 16th, 2019.

NGC SCHOOLS SPONSORED IN WISCONSIN BY WGCF TRI-COUNCIL

How Do They Work?

Article 3 in a series

WGCF's President appoints the Chairperson for each scheduled school to be held in Wisconsin. Tri-Council leadership may offer suggestions based on its familiarity of where schools have been held, a likely District to host the next school and who might be a good Chairperson. Our preference would be to hold schools throughout Wisconsin making them accessible to interested students around the state without requiring lengthy travel all the time from less populated areas. Once the host District for a school has been decided and a Chairperson appointed, work begins. The Chairperson recruits and appoints a Local Chairperson and Registrar.

The Chairperson works with the corresponding NGC School Chair to get all requirements completed and approved by NGC well in advance of the first school. That includes recruiting qualified instructors from the area, assembling their qualifications, advising them on the course topics that must be covered in their class, submitting their qualifications to NGC for certification, collecting test questions and handouts for each class and arranging for their equipment needs. This Chairperson, with assistance from the Local Chairperson and Registrar prepares and submits timely notices to all WGCF members including a registration form in *Wisconsin Gardens* magazine. They also prepare a school budget for approval by the WGCF Board of Directors once the necessary information is available. Prior approved budgets provide a good starting point for the new Chairperson. In the meantime, the Local Chairperson arranges the logistical details for the school, e.g., securing a venue, identifying nearby housing for students, arranging for food for each of the two days, securing audio and any other technical equipment needed by the instructors. The State Chairperson and the Local Chairperson can adjust duties between the two people as will work best for them. For example it may be that the Local Chairperson would have better access to instructors and take charge of securing and working with the instructors while the State Chairperson performs other duties. The Registrar prepares to work with each registering student. Each student receives confirmation of their reservation from the Registrar. Registration fees are managed within the Tri-Council financial system. The Chairperson recruits 2 or more people attending the school but not taking the exam to see that every test question is adequately covered in the class by each instructor. These class monitors also conduct a review for the students taking the exams after the last class is concluded and before the exam begins at the end of the second day. They will be chosen from people who are already certified Consultants in the school subject and are attending the school to refresh or simply to support the school.

After the exam is concluded, the monitors assemble the exams and give them to the School Chairperson who scores them and sends the results to the NGC School Chair for certification. Each student receives notice of their results from NGC after they are received by the School Chairperson. This provides each student with documentation leading to certification as a "Consultant" in the area studied after successfully completing all 4 courses. Article #4 will provide an overview of the contents of each course.

WGCF Standing Rules Changes

The WGCF Executive Committee approved changes to the WGCF Standing Rules at its meeting in October 2018. The Standing Rules relate to the day-to-day operations of the WGCF. The changes create a streamline of some of these functions and clarify the roles of officers and committee chairs. The Executive Committee's decision to create an internal Continuing Education fund is defined in the new Standing Rules. This new Continuing Education fund combines the Ruth and John West Education Endowment Fund with new contributions to provide monies for WGCF sponsored schools, symposia and refreshers. In the future, it may also, provide scholarships to members for attending these events.

Members may now choose where to place their life member, memorial and tribute donations. Previously, all donations were restricted to the scholarship fund managed and held by the Community Foundation of the Fox River Valley. With the advent of the new Continuing Education Fund, members have the choice of keeping their donations within the WGCF. New forms, reflecting these changes, are available on the WGCF website under "forms." They are available to download as fillable forms or to be printed and completed by hand. Please feel free to contact me with any questions.

American Hosta Society to hold National Convention in Green Bay June 12-15

Hundreds of garden enthusiasts from around the country and the world are expected to attend the 51st annual American Hosta Society (AHS) National Convention, being held at the Radisson Hotel & Convention Center in Green Bay on June 12-15, 2019.

Founded in 1968, the AHS is a non-profit organization that has grown from a handful of members in its early days to about 3,000 active members today. As the world's leading association promoting *Hosta*, their purpose is to foster the development of the genus and its public interest and, of course, share with others the enjoyment that hostas and gardening in general offer.

Hostas are often referred to as the "Friendship Plant" because they can be easily divided and shared with others. Appropriately, the theme for the 2019 event is "*Hostaffinity*," emphasizing the relationship and affinity that people have toward hosta and other hosta enthusiasts.

A major part of the convention is participating in area garden tours by motor coach bus. There are 10 private gardens that will be featured over the span of two days, with many displays topping more than 1,000 *Hosta* varieties.

New Insect Pest found on Evergreen Decorations

Plant health officials are cautioning consumers to burn wreaths and other evergreen decorations, or bag them and put them in the trash, after inspectors found invasive insects on many such items sold at large chain stores in Wisconsin this holiday season.

Inspectors found an insect called elongate hemlock scale, or EHS, on wreaths, swags and boughs, and in arrangements of evergreen boughs in hanging baskets, porch pots, mugs, and sleighs. EHS saps nutrients as it feeds on the underside of conifer needles, and threatens Wisconsin's Christmas tree farms, native hemlock and balsam fir forests, and ornamental conifers in yards and parks.

"It's fine to keep your decorations up for the holiday season, but when it's time to dispose of them, don't put them on the compost pile or set the greens out for brush collection. Burn them if you can. If you can't do that, bag them and send them to the landfill," advised Brian Kuhn, director of the Plant Industry Bureau in the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. "EHS has survived in the northeastern U.S., so winter weather will not kill it. As a result, if you compost this material, the insects may well attack conifers in your yard or neighborhood, and spread from there."

EHS is native to Asia, and has been introduced into Michigan and many Eastern states.

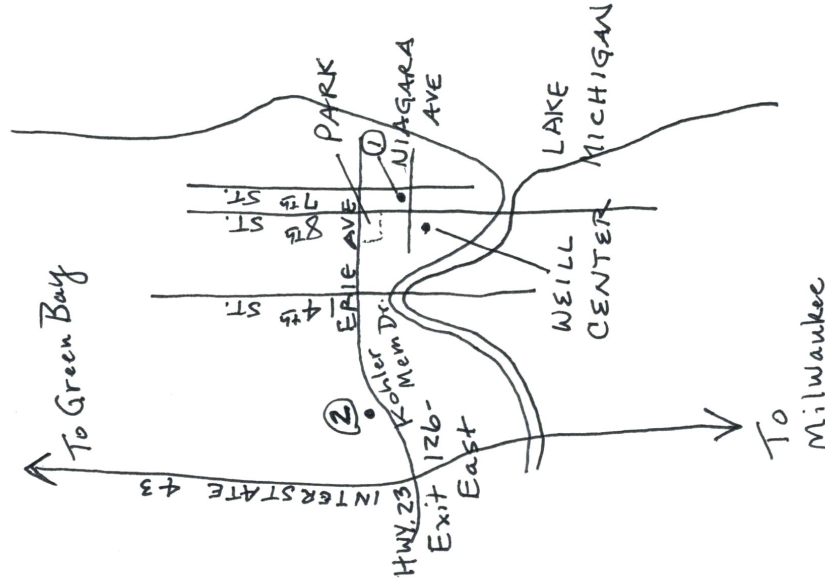
